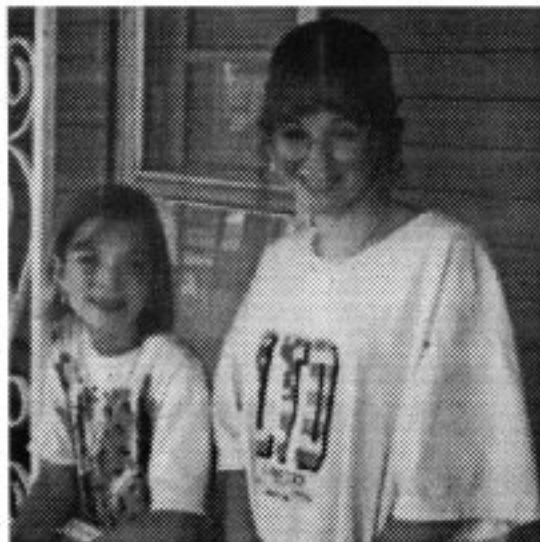

# Twenty Years Ago — 1975-1995...

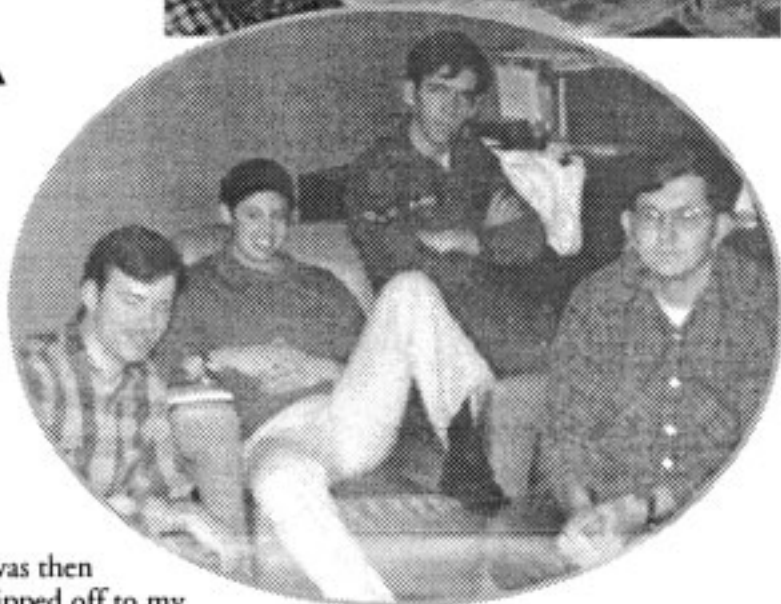
**1** I joined the USAF in March. I decided I better look more presentable when I arrived at boot camp in San Antonio, TX, so I shaved my beard off and cut my hair!
